Some of the frustrations now spilling over at town halls with Republican lawmakers. NBC's chief White House correspondent Peter Alexander has that story for us. Peter, good morning.

PETER ALEXANDER: Good morning. So much of the political debate right now, the fireworks have moved from here in Washington to the home districts where they are coming face to face with constituents pressing for answers on all sorts of topics. High among them, the President's policies and its impacts on their wallet. It comes as the President has set steep new tariffs. This morning, voters raising concerns about the economy. At a town hall overnight for Republican Mike Flood of Nebraska, anger erupting over a range of Trump administration moves, including the President's economic agenda.

LIBERAL QUESTIONER AT FLOOD TOWN HALL: Why does it seem like, when you're making your voting decisions, they're based on capital rather than the working class.

FLOOD: With all due respect, sir, the — [SHOUTING] — the Republican party now more than ever represents the heart and soul of the working class. [BOOS]

ALEXANDER: Voters protesting the congressman's support for the President's massive tax cut and spending bill. A new AP poll this morning shows that Americans are concerned about the economy and rising prices. About half those polled consider the cost of groceries to be a major source of stress and almost 20 percent of those people have used deferred payment services to

fund groceries at some point.
