[ON-SCREEN HEADLINE: New Details on Deadly ICE Shooting]

PRISCILLA THOMPSON: We are told that those two surviving victims remain in critical condition with Mexican authorities confirming that one of them is a Mexican national, and while President Trump and members of his administration are tying this attack to what they call rhetoric on the left against ICE and law enforcement, investigators on the ground say the shooter's motive remains unclear.

911 DISPATCHER: Multiple people shot.

THOMPSON: There are many questions about what led to deadly shooting at an ICE field office in Dallas.

THOMPSON: No officers were hurt in the attack, but investigators believe the gunman was targeting law enforcement, releasing this image of a bullet casing found near the shooter with "anti-ICE" written on it. Photos released by DHS also show bullet holes in a window and an American flag inside the facility. Multiple senior law enforcement officials identifying the suspected shooter as 29-year-old Joshua Jahn. In an interview with NBC News, the shooter's brother describing him as someone who "didn't have strong feelings about ICE," adding "he wasn't interested in politics on either side" as far as he knew. President Trump blaming the shooting on what he called "radical left Democrats, constantly demonizing law enforcement and comparing ICE officers to 'Nazis.'"

VICE PRESIDENT JD VANCE: If your political rhetoric encourages violence against our law enforcement, you can go straight to hell.

THOMPSON: This morning the mayor of Dallas calling for peace and unity.

DALLAS MAYOR ERIC JOHNSON (R): ...to support one another. Help us all get through this very difficult time, not just in our city but in our country.

MELVIN: Priscilla, at this point, what — what more do we know about the suspect or even his background?

THOMPSON: Yeah, Craig, so NBC News spoke with the brother of the suspect, and he said that

while his parents owned a gun, his brother was by no means a marksman. He also said that both of them were Boy Scouts growing up, and we did speak with a Boy Scout trooper who has known the alleged shooter since he was a teen and he described a conversation several years ago about the migrant caravans that were heading into the U.S. and he said that the shooter expressed being upset with how immigration was being handled in the country and the idea that people did not understand the desperation of people to try to get out of a bad situation. But that trooper also said that he did not know the shooter as someone who was violent. He knew him as someone who was against gun violence, so he found it surprising to find that he would be responsible for an attack like this.
