[ON-SCREEN HEADLINE: ICE Shooting Investigation]

REBECCA JARVIS: We turn now to new details on the shooting at a Dallas immigration office that left one detained dead and two others wounded. Officials now say the suspect was targeting ICE agents before he turned the gun on himself. Mireya Villarreal is in Dallas with more. Good morning, Mireya.

[ON-SCREEN HEADLINE: Breaking at 8; New Details on Deadly Dallas ICE Shooting]

MIREYA VILLARREAL: Good morning, Rebecca. A lot of new information coming out in this investigation pick we now know a law enforcement believes the shooter acted alone. He wasn't associated with any hate groups, and they also say they have video of him with a big ladder on the top of his vehicle, a ladder they believe he used to gain access to the top of this building and then take his shots into that ICE facility. New video first obtained by ABC News showing the moment gunfire erupted at a Dallas ICE facility. Everyone ducking for cover, then rushing inside for safety. The detainees shackled at the hands and ankles, some crawling just to get away. Agents then seen approaching the vans, peering inside, carrying victims away. One detainee killed, to others critically wounded. No ICE agents were injured.

ACTING U.S. ATTORNEY FOR THE NORTHERN DISTRICT OF TEXAS NANCY LARSON: He hoped his actions would terrorize ICE employees, and interfere with their work, which he called "human trafficking" and this, what he did, is the very definition of terrorism.

VILLARREAL: The suspect, identified as 29-year-old Joshua Jahn, investigators say they found several handwritten notes in his home. One revealed a high degree of pre-attack planning, another note reading, "hopefully this will give ICE agents real terror to think, 'is there a sniper with AP rounds on that roof?" Authorities say the suspect was using ICE tracking apps to pinpoint agents locations. Agents seen running back outside to pull the detainees to safety.

LARSON: While the bullets were flying, these agents were heroic. Clearly willing to lay down their lives to save the lives of the detainees in their custody.

VILLARREAL: Law enforcement's believe the shooter had been planning this for months, even purchasing legally that eight-millimeter bolt action rifle all the way back in August. Deborah?
