[ON-SCREEN HEADLINE: Breaking News; Clock Ticking Down to Government Shutdown]

GEORGE STEPHANOPOULOS: First, the looming government shutdown. It looks all but certain that the midnight deadline to keep the government running will pass without a deal, as Democrats push for healthcare, Republicans demand extension of current funding without restoring health spending, and the President posts deepfake videos on social media overnight. Senior political correspondent Rachel Scott starts us off. Good morning, Rachel.

RACHEL SCOTT: George, good morning to you. And this has really taken a turn in the last couple of hours here. Vice President JD Vance now saying that all signs are pointing to a government shutdown. This morning no breakthrough, and lawmakers only have a few hours to reach a deal. With just hours until the midnight deadline, Congress barreling toward a government shutdown. Congressional leaders leaving the White House without a deal.

HOUSE MINORITY LEADER HAKEEM JEFFRIES (D-NY) [on 09/29/25]: There was a frank and direct discussion with the President of the United States and Republican leaders, but significant and meaningful differences remain.

SCOTT: Democrats refusing to back down, saying they will not vote to fund the government

unless Republicans reverse cuts to Medicaid and keep healthcare premiums from rising for some 20 million Americans.

SENATE MINORITY LEADER CHUCK SCHUMER (D-NY) [on 09/29/25]: - they just wanted to kick the healthcare problem down the road.

SCOTT: Vice President JD Vance with this warning.

VICE PRESIDENT JD VANCE [on 09/29/25] I think we're headed to a shutdown because the Democrats won't do the right thing.

SCOTT: And just hours after that meeting, the President turning to mocking Democratic leadership with an A.I. generated video on social media, with fabricated and false audio. The video shows an A.I. version of House Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries wearing a sombrero and a fake mustache, with fabricated audio of Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer. Jeffries writing on X, "Bigotry will get you nowhere. We are NOT backing down." And this morning, the White House is now threatening to fire not just furlough workers under programs that are, quote, "...not consistent with the President's priorities." If the government shuts down, as many as four millions federal employees could go without a paycheck. Two million troops could be forced to work without pay, leaving military families in limbo. Heather Campbell's husband is a Major in the Air Force in Alabama. She worries about making ends meet for their three kids.

HEATHER CAMPBELL: We're not talking about faceless humans in a faraway office. We're talking about men and women, and moms and dads, and grandparents and sisters and uncles [SCREEN WIPE] And they want to show up and do a good job, and they want to be honest, hardworking Americans. And they're getting caught in the middle of this political rhetoric.

SCOTT: Republicans say that Democrats should support funding the government without any strings attached. So, today in the Senate, they are going to force a vote on a bill that does not include any of the Democratic demands. But they still need the support of at least seven Senate Democrats in order to get that bill passed. The bottom line here, Robin, someone has to compromise to avert this shutdown, and neither side is backing down.

ROBIN ROBERTS: Does appear that way, Rachel. Alright, thanks to you.

STEPHANOPOULOS: We start with the looming government shutdown. Jeffries rating on social media, "Bigotry will get you nowhere. We are NOT backing down." If the government does shut down, millions of federal workers could go without pay, including many of our troops. Now, the White House is threatening to not just furlough but fire workers who work under programs that do not align with the President's priorities. The bottom line here, Michael, in order to avert the shutdown, both sides need to compromise and both sides at this point are only digging in.
