Police now say at least 15 people were shot and killed at a celebration on the first night of Hanukkah. The suspected gunmen identified as a father and son. NBC's Sarah James is in Sydney for us. Sarah, good morning.

SARA JAMES: Good morning, Craig. Well, Australia's prime minister is saying there's no evidence of any wider collusion. The pair, motivated by extremist ideology, carrying out a terrifying attack that has shattered this community. JAMES: Some here asking how the alleged gunman amassed an arsenal in a country famous for strict gun control. Australia's prime minister today says laws may need to be even tougher and that more will need to be done to help the nation's Jewish community. A prominent Jewish leader here, whose friend died in the attack, says his community has been warning the government of a dangerous rise in anti-Semitism.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL OF AUSTRALIAN JEWRY CEO ALEX RYVCHIN: I can't imagine a time when the Jewish community will be safe — [SCREEN WIPE] — without looking over their shoulders.
