[ON-SCREEN HEADLINE: New Faceoff]

CRAIG MELVIN: New face-off. Another wave of protests erupting in Minneapolis overnight, after yet another shooting. This time, a federal agent opening fire on a Venezuelan man accused of resisting arrest and attacking that officer.

MINNEAPOLIS POLICE CHIEF BRIAN O'HARA: During the struggle, the federal agent discharged his weapon, striking one adult male.

MELVIN: We're live on the scene.

[ON-SCREEN HEADLINE: New Overnight Shooting in Minneapolis]

LAURA JARRETT: Turning now to that breaking news overnight in Minneapolis. Tense new protests erupting across the city, after another shooting involving a federal agent. NBC's Shaquille Brewster is on the ground for us once again in Minneapolis and has the very latest. Shaq, good morning.

SHAQ BREWSTER: Good morning. The situation here just continues to intensify. The day that started with a prayer vigil here, honoring one week since the death of Renee Good, ended with another shooting involving a federal agent, who DHS says was attacked and ambushed, sparking yet another round of clashes. Overnight, another shooting involving a federal officer, causing chaos in Minneapolis. Protesters gathering at the scene, setting off fireworks and throwing rocks at police. The city's police chief calling for calm.

O'HARA: The crowd is engaging in unlawful acts.

BREWSTER: DHS says federal officers stopped an immigrant from Venezuela, who allegedly resisted arrest. DHS claiming two other people joined the struggle and the original target began striking the officer with "a shovel or broomstick," adding that the officer was fearing for his life, and fired, hitting the man in the leg. The city's mayor speaking out.

MINNEAPOLIS MAYOR JACOB FREY (D): This is an impossible situation that our city is presently being put in.

BREWSTER: Meanwhile, Democratic Governor Tim Walz writing, “I know you’re angry. I’m angry. What Donald Trump wants is violence in the streets....Don’t give him what he wants.” While Trump’s deputy attorney general posting that ICE agents are “doing their jobs,” adding “Walz and Frey - I’m focused on stopping YOU from your terrorism by whatever means necessary. This is not a threat. It’s a promise.” This just the latest in a growing wave of confrontations between residents and federal officers in Minneapolis, sparked by the shooting of Renee Nicole Good by an ICE officer a week ago. The Trump administration saying the mother of three weaponized her car and was a threat to the agent, which has been disputed by local politicians and yesterday DHS saying the officer suffered internal bleeding after the incident. The White House also defending ICE’s actions in Minnesota —

ACTING ICE DIRECTOR TODD LYONS [on FNC’s *America Reports*, 01/14/26]: We are going after the worst of the worst.

BREWSTER: — while a lawyer for the Good family is demanding answers.

ANTONIO ROMANUCCI: Our understanding that the mission coming into Minneapolis was to get the worst of the worst. I can tell you one thing, Renee Good was the best of the best.

BREWSTER: Her family this morning remembering the 37-year-old mother of three as a beautiful light. Now, in an interview overnight, President Trump calling the shooting unfortunate, saying it was sad on both sides. We know that Renee Good’s family’s attorney telling me, they are calling for a transparent investigation, saying that they are considering filing a civil lawsuit. Laura?

JARRETT: Alright, Shaquille Brewster in Minneapolis. Thank you, Shaq.
